Basketball ACT (BACT) has been active on and off the court over the past 12 months.

While still working to improve service delivery to BACT members, competition management, support our elite programs and advocate for further facilities in the region, the Association has seen a turnover of staff and strengthening of our Committee activity.

Player numbers continue to be at record levels, particularly in the junior ranks, our senior Waratah League and junior representative teams had significant success; we are engaging with the ACT Government and stakeholders in seeking further facilities and are moving to consolidate our staff and provide proper training to ensure we are delivering a professional and competent service.

In 2019, BACT Operations Manager, Matthew Dunstan, moved into the CEO role but returned to Melbourne midway through the year for family reasons. We are pleased to advise that move has been positive for the family and wish Matthew all the best in his career.

The Board was pleased to appoint David Simpson, a senior officer at Sports Australia to the CEO role. David brings significant expertise and understanding of sport, including local sport, to the role. We are confident he will provide strong ongoing I eadership for the Board, staff and members in his role. Another positive appointment has been the recruitment of Ken Kennedy as Operations Manager.

There has also been turnover of staff in the competition, referees, community development, finance and communications areas of BACT. Thank you to those staff members and we welcome our new staff and look forward to their contribution to ACT basketball. This staff turnover has provided an opportunity to examine the staff structure to ensure greater focus on members' services and competition management.

The Board has also seen changes in 2019, with the current Board of seven bringing real skills, expertise, networks and knowledge of the sport. The current Board has overseen some necessary activity, including the rewriting of the By-Laws through the refocussed Competition Committee, reworking of the BACT Constitution for approval from the Clubs at the Annual General Meeting, establishment of a support group for our Waratah League programs, and consolidation of our finances.

The Board has moved to ensure the financial viability of all Clubs and appointed two support officers to assist and consolidate the Gungahlin Flames Club throughout the year.

As noted in the last Annual report, Basketball ACT is finding it difficult to accommodate the increased player numbers and competitions due to a lack of adequate available court space. The Board's Facilities Committee has identified a number of possible venues for future development and discussion with key stakeholders.

BACT's representative programs had some significant success through the year. Our Waratah League program saw the senior women make the grand final, our junior men win their grand final, and our Waratah men making a late run to fall short of their finals. Our junior program continues to produce results with several teams doing well at National Championships and a number of players making Australian sides, elite training programs and playing in the US college system. Congratulations to all coaches, officials and the High Performance Committee for their leadership through the year. The 2020 Waratah League program has been bolstered with the establishment of a support group overseen by the Board.

Our officials/referees' committee continues to train and develop bench and on-court officials for BACT and representative programs. Of note is the selection of local referee Jack Taylor to officiate at the Oceania Junior Women's Championship in New Caledonia through the year.

While there has been a considerable turnover in staff over 2019, the Board looks forward to 2020 to stabilise the ship and move Basketball ACT well forward.







Chief Executive Officer's Report

avid Simpson - CEO

Whilst my tenure with Basketball ACT only commenced after the end of the financial year, it is still with great pleasure that I present the CEO report for 2019.

By all accounts 2019 was in many aspects a year of growth and advancement, however it was also a relatively tumultuous year for the organisation reflected by its financial performance and staff turnover in management positions.

Whilst the organisation saw a relatively high turnover of staff in management positions, it is a credit to the core staff that service delivery to our members remained high with limited interruptions to programs, competitions, or events. Basketball ACT remains in an enviable position, where participation demands now exceeds the availability of facilities to deliver our wide range of programs and competitions.

The Treasurers report shows that it has been a relatively tough year financially for the organisation. The cost of outsourcing facilities for competition and high-performance programs continues to be a considerable burden on the organisation's finances, and has been one of the primary contributors to the reported loss during the last financial year. While our short-term reliance on external facilities will continue to hamper efforts to grow and expand the organisation and its products; it is pleasing to report that the considerable work undertaken during the year by my predecessors is now starting to show dividends. The ACT Government will partner with Basketball ACT to undertake a feasibility study into the potential expansion of the Belconnen precinct (due for completion April 2020). However, the anticipation and excitement generated from any potential stadium upgrade will be tempered by the reality of needing to secure additional revenue streams to support the anticipated maintenance and operational costs that will inevitably arise. This will be area that will continue to be a focus moving forward.

It is pleasing to report that Competitions have continued to grow year-on-year, particularly in the junior ranks with growth of approximately 9% between winter competitions; and 5% in junior summer competitions. Much of the credit for this junior competition growth should go to the clubs for their efforts in providing services that encourage the recruitment and retainment of members. To this end, special mention must go out to all the volunteers that contribute their valuable time and resources to our clubs. Without you, the lifeblood of our sport, none of what we have achieved would have been possible. It would also be remiss of me to not recognise the match and technical officials that also regularly contribute their time to ensuring the smooth running of our competitions.

Senior competitions have continued to follow a slight downward trend, however there is confidence that this trend has now been addressed with many of the underlying factors resolved. Looking forward an upward trend is now anticipated for seniors over the next twelve months.

Our development programs have continued to expand, with increased levels of participation in our Aussie Hoops, Under 8's Superstars, Pink Stars, Night Hoops and Mums Who Ball programs. Unfortunately, 3x3 has not seen the levels of support initially anticipated and will remain a challenge to fully unlock its potential in 2020.

Whilst the annual report serves as a powerful platform to reflect on the year, it is important that we continue looking forward, as there is much to be excited about for our sport in the coming year, including new products and initiatives, potential facility developments, and the excitement of the Olympics including the debut of 3x3.

There are still many challenges facing the organisation in 2020. A review of the organisation's financial position and result for 2019 shows cause for considerable constraint in order to ensure our stability and viability going forward. The challenge of continuing to maintain an ageing facility also has its own challenges, as does securing sufficient court space to accommodate ever expanding competitions. That said, there is light on the horizon.

Basketball ACT has continued its partnership with the University of Canberra in 2020, locking in a further year on our facility use agreement, which guarantees us significant exclusive court access, including throughout peak periods. Furthermore, the ACT Government's support for a feasibility study into the use of the vacant block to the south of the stadium provides a level of encouragement that the Government considers the expansion of the Belconnen site footprint to be a real possibility.

With a new year comes other new opportunities, including the roll out of new products such as walking basketball and wheelchair basketball, and the expansion of our 3x3 offering.

Finally, I would like to make special mention to the incredible Board and staff at Basketball ACT, all of whom are incredibly dedicated to ensuring the most for the sport in the ACT.

Whilst I have only been here a short time, I am incredibly proud of what the organisation has achieved in the past year, and despite the many hurdles, we are still very well placed for a strong 2020. I look forward to working with you all even closer in the coming year.

Treasurer's Report

Shane Lowndes - Treasurer

For the year ending 30 September 2019, Basketball ACT (BACT) would like to report a deficit of \$256,783 on Total Revenue of \$3,115,532 and Net Assets of \$5,009,883.

Total Revenue for the 2019 financial year of \$3,115,532 (2018: \$3,266,278) represents a decrease of approximately 4.6%. Competitions Revenue of \$2,235,133 in 2019 represented approximately 72% of Total Revenue. A decrease in Competition Revenue of 7% from \$2,405,110 in 2018 to \$2,235,133 in 2019 had a significant impact on the decrease in Revenue overall.

Total Expense for the 2019 financial year was \$3,372,315 (2018: \$3,212,263); an increase of approximately 4.7%. External Court Hire and Competition outgoings had a significant impact on the increase in Expense overall.

The Total Comprehensive Income for the year is reported as (\$256,783) (2018: \$125,136).

The cash position as at 30 September 2019 was \$510,762, an increase of \$142,581 from the same time in 2018.

Net Assets as at 30 September 2019 are \$5,009,883 (2018: \$5,266,666) and the decrease reflects the increase in our Unearned Revenue Liabilities due to the timing of the 2019/2020 Summer Season Fees received. Additionally, our Auditors Vincents previously recommended that the Board undertake revaluations approximately every 3 years and this has been considered by the Board during this current financial period. The Balance Sheet reflects a stable position for BACT.

As in previous years, a focus continues to be on prudent management of Receivables and Payables for the Association. The Board has in place a range of payment polices which might be called upon where teams, clubs and individuals fail to meet payment obligations. These continue to be acted upon throughout 2019 & 2020.

We continue to recognise that the consequences of this can have a significant impact on players and member clubs and decisions to introduce penalties are not taken lightly by the BACT Board. The staff and Board of Basketball ACT recognise the need to offer continued support to member clubs, particularly in the administration of finances and it will continue to be a focus of the Board going forward.

We are pleased to advise our Auditors Vincents have stated the Financial Statements as at 30 September 2019 represent a true and fair view of the financial position of Basketball ACT for 2019.









The annual Canberra Classic started the 2019 season on the Australia Day weekend, with 25 teams competing. The winning teams were:

The 2019 Season showed stable team numbers across the senior competitions, with good growth in the Premier and Slam/Open competitions. Having the additional teams in the Premier competition allowed for a more balanced draw for the season in both Premier 1 Men's and Women's.

The large number of teams on Thursday nights across A Grade and Premier 2 meant there was some issues with court space, especially at Belconnen.

Junior basketball competitions across the ACT have continued to grow in 2019.

The local Junior Competitions have seen a growth of approximately 7% for the 2018/2019 Summer Season and a growth of 5% for the 2019 Winter Season. These increases are spanning across all age groups and divisions. The trend of team numbers being higher in Summer seasons continued again in 2019.

The 2019 Sue Geh Cup and Jamie Pearlman Cup saw an increase of over 50% of team numbers from 2018. The 2019 Kate Tominac Cup and John Stelzer Cup had a slight increase in the number of teams as well. The addition of an U15s division allowed for younger high school students to participate. Surrounding NSW based schools are starting to enter these competitions on a regular basis.

Court space is becoming a significant issue for junior competitions as numbers continue to grow. The basketball facility at the University of Canberra (UC) was used for Friday night and Sunday morning competitions to cater for the increase in junior teams.

Referees Report

We are pleased to see major growth in referee numbers in the past year in our junior competitions. Off the back of three junior referee courses, we were able to increase our numbers by over 100 referees. To support this, a new grading method was introduced, that easily allowed feedback to be recorded and forwarded to individual referees, to assist in their development.

Sixteen ACT referees, as well as a referee instructor, were involved across seven national tournaments throughout year. Mitchell Hudson was appointed to a bronze medal game in the Under 20 Men, whilst Harrison Savill was nominated to the Gold Medal Men's at the Ivor Burge Championships. While Sharna Edwards was our representative score table official at the U16 Junior Championships, and Michael Hanley as our representative statistician at the U18 Junior Championships

Basketball ACT's senior program has also seen major growth in 2019, as we continued to introduce our junior referees to this level of competition. A senior social referee coordinator was introduced in 2019, to assist in gaining full coverage on our senior games, as well as providing mentoring and guidance for senior social referees. A senior social referee course was held in October of this year, adding a new group of referees to the senior social competition.

Our premier league and development panel referees have grown tremendously in the past 12 months, with new additions to both panels and new members appointed to our premier division games, and additional referees on A-grade.

In the elite environment, we are pleased to have seen Mitchell Hudson nominated for the first time to WNBL Referees Panel, while Jack Taylor became just the second official ever from the ACT to receive his international license from FIBA - a reminder of how much our little Territory punches above its weight.

Finally, we would like to recognise and acknowledge the tremendous work of our volunteers - the referee coaches, score table officials, statisticians, as well as our members who work tirelessly behind the scenes doing rostering, management and helping our program run smoothly. We would also like to give a special thanks to Marlene Leonard for her continued contribution to our program.

Development Report

Chloe Tugliach - Development Office

After a year of growth and laying foundations throughout 2018, this year was set to be one of excitement and expansion... and that it was!

We welcomed Darcy Malone into the Development space and with him were able to deliver entry level programs across 25 primary, secondary and specialist schools. Through Sport Australia's Sporting Schools program, a \$200 million Australian Government initiative, we have been able to meet and deliver basketball experiences to over 4250 school aged students. A proud moment for our department was being in a position to donate portable basketball hoops to Monash Primary School as part of our Community Outreach Initiative. Our team, along with some of the elite men and women from our Gunners and Nationals Waratah teams, delivered a fun and inclusive program to the students.

In 2020 we hope to continue delivering basketball experiences to school children across the ACT that leave a lasting impression. After its initial success in 2018, we again ran the In-The-Mix 'rep-ready' program, seeing 150 participants in the U11, U13 and U15 age groups through the 10-week program. With a focus on building fundamental skills as well as team play aspects (3v3 and 5v5) the program positioned participants well heading into their respective representative trials.

In 2019 our Learn-to-Play programs continued to bring in stable numbers across programs covering the Gungahlin, Belconnen, Tuggeranong and Woden regions. Aussie Hoops, the nationally accredited introduction to basketball program, currently runs at 8 locations around Canberra, with 830 children participating in the fun, game-based sessions throughout the year. Basketball Australia has been working on some exciting changes that will coming in 2020 for the Aussie Hoops program, and we are enthusiastic to continue our support of the program.

Our 8 and Unders Superstars program continued to grow at a rapid pace, with over 120 new participants joining the program in 2019. We are excited to announce that in 2020, to support our commitment to increasing participation in girls and women, we will be introducing a "girls only" 8 and Unders Superstars program. This will support the girl's only Pink Stars Aussie Hoop program that we successfully introduced in Term 3 of this year.

We are pleased to announce that in 2020 we have secured funding to run Walking Basketball, in partnership with Basketball Australia, 3x3 Community Hustle, in partnership with the NBL and Basketball Australia, and Night Hoops.

We are also working with students at the Canberra Institute of Technology (CIT) to bring back our Mums Who Ball and Baby Ballers programs.

Looking forward, 2020 is shaping up to be a year of building, and in some instances rebuilding, relationships with the ACT community, as well as celebrating the diverse and unique individuals within the basketball community.

Development will shift into Community Basketball with the goal of being adaptive and inclusive across all Basketball ACT programs and competitions.

I would like to personally take a moment to thank the BACT community, our participants, our parents, our referees, our volunteers, the BACT Board and most importantly the BACT Staff. To be welcomed with open arms by what has grown to be my now wildly passionate, supportive and ever-challenging basketball family is something I will forever be grateful for. I am excited for what is to come and believe in the direction Basketball ACT is heading, and hope that our sport will continue to thrive for many years to come.







High Performance

Phil Brown - Head of High Performance

The Basketball ACT High Performance Committee (HPC) establishes the strategic direction and policies for the ACT High Performance Programs. This includes the appointment of Coaches and Managers to all programs, annual reviews of each program and providing support for the ongoing professional development of coaches from the U12 & U14 Boys and Girls Canberra Representative, ACT U16, U18 & U20 Junior State Representative Programs through to the senior Canberra Gunners, Gunners Academy and Canberra Nationals Teams.

The HPC establishes the High Performance (HP) selection criteria, develops training and competition programs to strengthen the HP Pathway, determines athlete eligibility and selection criteria for HP junior programs and creates the ACT HP philosophy including The ACT Way and ACT Style of Play. These documents can be accessed on the BACT website. The HPC have developed Head Coach, Assistant Coach and Manager Agreements for all volunteer staff working in BACT HP Programs. Coaches are required to have Basketball Australia Coaching Accreditation and to continue to access coaching clinics and participate in HP activities including NPP minicamps, monthly coaching forums to further develop their coaching knowledge and capabilities.

The HPC meet regularly throughout the year to discuss strategies to enhance and develop programs to support talented athletes on the Basketball ACT High Performance Pathway. These include the ongoing development the National Performance Program (NPP) in partnership with the ACT Academy of Sport and Basketball Australia to support identified ACT junior players that have the potential to progress to the higher levels of the sport. The NPP conducts weekly individual and small group skill sessions and twice weekly athletic development sessions at ACTAS. The NPP conducts minicamps with invited National and BA Centre of Excellence Coaches leading those sessions.
